


Tiddalick the Frog




The following story is based on a traditional Aboriginal Dreamtime story about a frog called Tiddalick.

angry at him. The animals knew that they had to get the water back somehow. If they wanted to get all the water out of Tiddalick and back onto the billabong, they would have to make him laugh. The wise owl suggested that if he laughed, all the water would come out.




First, the echidna tried to make him laugh. The echidna rolled down the hill into the dried up billabong. Tiddalick didn't laugh.


ablo Picasso was born in Malaga,
Spain in 1881. As a boy he was always drawing and could draw before he could talk. Picasso painted a portrait at age 13 and by the age of 15 he had enrolled in a fine art school. The entrance test was quite difficult but Picasso completed it with high scores and was placed in advanced courses. At the age of 19 he was living in Paris, France, enjoying museums and art galleries. During his time in Paris, his friend died and Picasso was very sad. He

started painting pictures with a deep blue background to express his sadness. Then a few years later he met some circus performers and started painting with brighter colors.


Picasso created over 50,000 works of art during his lifetime. He repeated all of his styles of art over and over again but also liked to try new ideas as well.




